



KEYNOTE SPEAKER: Dimitri A. Christakis, MD, MPH



The National's opening session, "Keeping Athletes Moving," will shine a light on the work podiatrists do to keep all athletes regardless of their health and ability status—active and mobile. APMA is

thrilled to welcome Special Olympics Chief Health Officer Dimitri A. Christakis, MD, MPH, as the keynote speaker for this session. In this position, Dr. Christakis is responsible for the health programs for five million athletes with intellectual and developmental disabilities in more than 190 countries and oversees. health programming of Special Olympics including prevention, assessment, training, and health system strengthening. He has a holistic view of health that encompasses the physical, mental, emotional, and social state of all of our athletes and their families.

Dr. Christakis is the George Adkins Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Washington and the editor in chief of JAMA Pediatrics. He graduated from Yale University and the University of

Pennsylvania School of Medicine, and he completed a pediatric residency followed by a Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholarship at the University of Washington, from which he received his MPH.

SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKER: Coach Lance Harter



The opening session will also include special quest speaker Coach Lance Harter, Harter served as head coach of the University of Arkansas women's cross-country and track and field

programs for 33 years, ending his tenure with the 2022-23 season. In that time, he became the most successful coach in Southeastern Conference history, amassing seven NCAA championships and 45 SEC championships. His athletes combined to earn 47 Academic All-America honors. At the national level, he has been a coach of Team USA five times, including serving as an assistant coach at the 1992 Summer Olympic Games in Barcelona and head coach at the 1999 World Championships.


